

'What Shall I Choose?'

By now most of you know of some of the medical challenges I have been having with my heart.

I believe it was in an e-mail that I shared with some of you of two different ways God could heal. I mentioned He could heal with the means of doctors and nurses, or He could heal apart from these medical means and just take the heart problems away. (I'm still jumping through the hoops, and a decision has not yet been made regarding treatment.) I then mentioned I will trust Him with whatever way He chooses to heal.

Almost immediately after I sent that e-mail, the Lord gently and playfully spoke in/through my spirit, suggesting, rightly (!), that I failed to mention another way He could heal. Some call it the "ultimate healing."

Years ago, Wayne Watson released a song with the title "Home Free." In the song, Watson describes praying for a young mother who was struggling with cancer. He wrote:

Out in the corridors, we pray for life A mother for her baby, A husband for his wife. Oh, sometimes the good die young, It's sad but true. And while we pray for one more heartbeat, the real comfort is with You. ... Home free, eventually: At the ultimate healing we will be home free. Home free, oh I've got a feeling, at the ultimate healing we will be home free. ... I know every prayer gets answered, but the hardest one to pray is slow to come.

Oh Lord! not mine! But Your will be done. I don't share this to be overly dramatic. In fact, sharing this at all is a bit uncomfortable, but I do so to remind myself and to encourage you of our good God and the comfort He brings. Back to this idea of my failing to mention another way God could heal. This is the way, as the song suggests, of an "ultimate healing."

Again, I sensed the Lord saying to me, "Bob, you missed another way I heal, and that would be for Me to bring you Home to Me. Are you okay with that?"! Of course, as a follower of Jesus, I am more than okay with that. While I have every hope and expectation to make it through the surgery, I might not make it through, and that's okay.

The recovery part is what scares me the most. Curiously, the Apostle Paul apparently had the opportunity to choose either life or death when He was in prison at Rome. Writing to the church in Philippi, he said, "For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain. If I am to go on living in the body, this will mean fruitful labor for me. Yet what shall I choose? I do not know! I am torn between the two: I desire to depart and be with Christ, which is better by far; but it is more necessary for you that I remain in the body. Convinced of this, I know that I will remain, and I will continue with all of you for your progress and joy in the faith, so that through my being with you again, your boasting in Christ Jesus will abound on account of me." (Philippians 1:21-26)

While being with Jesus may be called the "ultimate healing," He has given every one of us the desire to live in these bodies upon this earth. That is my desire, but if God has other plans, I'm okay with that, too.

So, whatever circumstance God may have you in today, please remember He loves you. And whatever kind of "healing" you might need — be it relational, emotional, physical or spiritual — He promises to walk with you every step of the way Home.
